
ALL AMERICAN BOYS by JASON REYNOLDS RACISM AND PREJUDICE

BENEATH A METH MOON by JACQUELINE WOODSON REALISTIC FICTION





MR. BESON'S pick SOCIAL MEDIA FICTION


CITY OF BEASTS by ISABEL ALLENDE Mr. Biehl's pick ACTION/ADVENTURE


CODE NAME VERITY by ELIZABETH WEIN HISTORICAL FICTION



King's smart, funny and boldly original writing shines in this powerful novel about learning to cope with the shrapnel life throws at you--and taking a stand against it.




HALF BROKE HORSES by JEANNETTE WALLS


GLORY O'BRIEN'S HISTORY OF THE FUTURE by A.S. KING FRIENDSHIP FICTION

As her high school graduation draws near, Glory O'Brien begins having powerful and terrifying visions of the future as she struggles with her long-buried grief over her mother's suicide




HIDDEN TALENTS by DAVID LUBAR COMIC


THE HOBBIT by J.R.R. TOLKIEN (or any book by this author) FANTASY

I AM THE MESSENGER by MARCUS ZUSAK (or any book by this author) DRAMA




THE LONE RANGER AND TONTO FISTFIGHT IN HEAVEN by SHERMAN ALEXIE DARK COMEDY

SURVIVAL STORIES

The *New York Times* bestseller *A Long Walk to Water* begins as two stories, told in alternating sections, about two eleven-year-olds in Sudan, a girl in 2008 and a boy in 1985. The girl, Nya, is fetching water from a pond that is two hours' walk from her home: she makes two trips to the pond every day. The boy, Salva, becomes one of the "lost boys" of Sudan, refugees who cover the African continent on foot as they search for their families and for a safe place to stay. Enduring every hardship from loneliness to attack by armed rebels to contact with killer lions and crocodiles, Salva is a survivor, and his story goes on to intersect with Nya's in an astonishing and moving way.




MARCELO IN THE REAL WORLD by FRANCISCO STORK COMING OF AGE

PURPLE HEART by PATRICIA MCCORMICK WAR NOVEL






THE RUNNING DREAM by WENDELIN VANDRAANER Ms Morrell's pick REALISTIC FICTION


A THOUSAND SPLENDID SUNS by KHALED HOSSEINI Ms. Morrell's pick

Born a generation apart and with very different ideas about love and family, Mariam and Laila are two women brought jarringly together by war, by loss and by fate. As they endure the ever escalating dangers around them-in their home as well as in the streets of Kabul-they come to form a bond that makes them both sisters and mother-daughter to each other, and that will ultimately alter the course not just of their own lives but of the next generation. With heart-wrenching power and suspense, Hosseini shows how a woman's love for her family can move her to shocking and heroic acts of self-sacrifice, and that in the end it is love, or even the memory of love, that is often the key to survival.




SCORPIA by ANTHONY HOROWITZ (or any book by this author) FANTASY


THE SILVER STAR by JEANNETTE WALLS Ms. Morrell's pick HISTORICAL FICTION


SIMON VS THE HOMO SAPIENS AGENDA by BECKY ALBERTALLI COMING OF AGE


THE TRAGEDY PAPER by ELIZABETH LABAN COMING OF AGE
